The Curate's Letter

Dear Friends,

September...and the children are going back to school. Can you remember what it felt like going back after the long summer break? Can you remember what it felt like starting in a new school, especially on the first day, when you hardly knew a soul? I don't expect that I am the only one who experiences collywobbles at the thought of walking into anywhere new for the first time, and sometimes it is even harder to come back to somewhere you know, if you have been away for a long time. Questions race through our minds, 'Will they ask where I have been?' 'Will they welcome me?' 'Will they turn their backs on me?' And then when we finally manage to get through the door, and the ice is broken, we can hardly remember what all the fuss was about.

The same is true for people who have drifted away from church. The reasons why they have drifted away are inconsequential. The fact is that there are many people who have, and chances are that each of us can name several. It may be hard to believe that many of these people, who once regularly attended church may be reluctant, nervous to come back to church.

Those of us who regularly attend can hardly comprehend what all the fuss is about. I know for myself that this was true... After we moved to Bury near Ramsey I had a period of time when, I wanted to go to church but just didn't, just couldn't. I knew when the services in our local church were but couldn't muster up the courage to walk up the hill and in the door. It was only when a friend invited us, the family, to attend the Easter service that I managed to get back on track (and I doubt that I would be here today if the invitation had not been made).

September 27 is *Back to Church Sunday*. This is the Sunday which has been designated as the day when we are asked to personally invite someone we know who know longer attends church to come back to church, for just one service, with no strings attached. The initiative is based on research that says that three million people, that is six per cent of the adult population, would come back to church if they received a personal invitation.

Research by the Diocese of Lichfield in 2008 following *Back to Church Sunday* suggested that 6,000 people came back to church on that day and that, six months later, between 700 and 900 (12-15 per cent) had become regular members. Now I think those figures are pretty impressive. It's amazing to think what a difference to someone's life and also to our church community your invitations could make.

Now, if by chance you don't feel able to offer the invitation on September 27, that doesn't mean that you shouldn't invite someone back on another Sunday.

So....who are you going to invite *Back to Church*?

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Charity of the month

Mashambanzou Care Trust

St Mary's has been a long-term supporter of Mashambanzou Care Trust – a small Zimbabwe-based charity that offers comfort and reassurance to poor people infected – or affected – by HIV/AIDS. The term Mashambanzou means 'dawn of a new day' and was chosen to offer inspiration to those suffering from HIV/AIDS. Mashambanzou Care Trust's vision is 'to contribute meaningfully towards a reduction in the vulnerability associated with HIV prevalence, so as to witness healthier individuals that are better able to take responsibility for their own lives.'

Through six community outreach programmes, Mashambanzou offers holistic health care to the poorest suburbs of Harare. This includes:

- Care for the sick in their homes and provision of counselling for their families
 - Support to AIDS orphans including school fees and uniforms; blankets, food and counselling
 - Raising public awareness in order to fight stigma and discrimination
 - Providing palliative care
 - Mobilising community support centres, care givers and counsellors
- AIDS is one of the most serious problems confronting Africa today and in Zimbabwe over a million people are living with the disease. Nevertheless – and despite the political difficulties the country has faced in the last few years – the prevalence of HIV is slowly declining, showing that Africa in general, and Zimbabwe in particular, is not a lost cause. The testimony of one person helped by Mashambanzou shows what

a difference a small organisation can make.

'I had lost hope. I was 42 and had severe oral thrush, I could not eat well and had lost weight. I thought I was not going to last another week of life. Mashambanzou Home-based Care team came to my house. They counselled me and I was able to disclose my status to my children. I got treated and was later admitted into the Care Unit at Mashambanzou in Waterfalls. It took two weeks for me to respond to treatment. I gained weight, the oral thrush disappeared, my appetite returned and sleepless nights became a thing of the past.

Thanks to Mashambanzou I am now on the feeding scheme, my children are taking good care of me and they seem to be coping well with our situation.'

Please give generously – a little of our money can make a vast amount of difference.

We moved to Godmanchester in 1999 when Matthew was six months old, having moved to Huntingdon with a two week old when Andrew became a GP at Priory Fields Surgery. It's always a gamble choosing where to live in a new area – but let's just say we've moved again, but it was within Godmanchester!

We both like getting involved – Andrew has been Godmanchester Scouts' treasurer for the last few years, chaired Stukeley Meadows Youth Football Club, hosts the Bible study group, is a sidesperson and has recently become Secretary of the PCC. St Mary's Church Youth Groups

Continuing our series of memories from our church youth groups, this month Helen Rogers (née Turrell) remembers her time there and one occasion in particular.

I had finally made it, at the age of twelve I was old enough to join the church youth group. Meeting at 6.30 pm on a Friday night the youth group was an opportunity to meet with friends and to enjoy fellowship together. Although, at the time, it simply felt like a fun evening of games and a chance to chat, really the youth group was my first introduction to worship songs and praying in groups. It was also an opportunity to discuss my faith with other people the same age as me as well as

the leaders, Paul Sibley and Claire Hurd, who did a fantastic job of keeping us entertained with games while also helping us to develop our understanding of God.

I have one very special memory of the youth group – our music hall evening! Weeks and weeks of rehearsals, agonising hours spent over which pieces we were going to perform and poor Mrs Hardy roped in as our pianist and singing coach; Pop Idol eat your heart out! So once I had decided I was going to deliver my best renditions of 'Diamonds are a girl's best friend' and 'Goldfinger' there was just my dress to consider. No, of course I could not borrow a dress from my Mum; it was Granny to the rescue and to the sewing machine! After hours of slaving over the sewing machine Granny had produced a fantastic dress to rival those seen at the Oscars. Finally my big night had arrived. Wearing the amazing black dress, evening gloves (borrowed from Granny's friend Clare Wells!) and an array of diamanté jewels, I stood on that stage and became Marilyn Monroe and Shirley Bassey; well in my head anyway. Overall the night was a great success which I remember was enjoyed by all. I was quite a shy girl when I was younger but I found that I gained a lot of confidence, not only in my dreams singing in the youth group, but also from an early age taking part in concerts given by the choir (another most enjoyable part of my church life at St Mary's) and from reading the Bible during services.

The youth group was a great experience and a really good way of keeping me connected to the church during my teenage years. It is so important to have this resource available to young people and it is wonderful to hear that St Mary's still runs a vibrant youth group.

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St Mary's was there in the beginning!

In our February magazine you may remember that there was an article in praise of church magazines, in which it stated that it is one hundred and fifty years since the Revd. J. Erskine Clarke launched what is thought to be the first 'parish magazine' on the world. This made me wonder when the first of our own parish magazines was published, since I remember that our former editor, Ian Dunbavan, at one time did a series with extracts from our magazines of one hundred years ago. I determined that once our new library opened I would take myself to the Archives Department and try to find out and this I did a few days ago.

I found that our first magazine was published in 1871, although there was no copy of that. The first magazine I actually discovered was entitled *All Saints and St John's*, Huntingdon, and at first I wondered why I had been given this particular copy, but then, as I read it, I found there were two pages right at the very end devoted to St Mary the Virgin, Godmanchester.

It appears the future of the magazine was, for some time, doubtful, since the first article reads:

'It was uncertain whether we should, as a magazine, live to wish our readers the compliments of the season, for though our circulation has on the whole been fairly steady, it has hardly been sufficient to pay its expenses. We have however arranged to continue it for some time longer, hoping for increased support, and we shall be much obliged to any one who will help us in adding to our list of subscribers. For those who desire to have the numbers of 1871 joined together, Mr A Ward can provide a good strong cover for one shilling (5p!). We have not, therefore, yet to take leave of our

readers, but are once more enabled, with thankfulness for all God's mercies, to our country, to our parish and to ourselves, to wish them one and all a happy New Year.'

This combined magazine at that time was 22 pages in length and contained a variety of articles. Of course, we all know *All Saints' Church*, but where I wonder was St John's? The magazine was professionally printed and bound, presumably by Mr Ward mentioned above, but as you can imagine it is now quite flimsy and has to be handled with much care. In its 22 pages it contained a story entitled *A visit of angels*, and a complaint by a local vicar (not our vicar of the time!) of a cart load of hay passing the vicarage in the street and dropping bits and pieces making a mess of his garden which he had tended with much care. I do sympathise with this as, at the present time, many tractors of hay seem to be making their way down the High Street here in Brampton, scattering remnants of hay into all our open plan front gardens. Nothing changes! There was also Chapter 1 of a serialised story entitled *Harry the Ringer*, a short sermon but with no mention of the author's name (perhaps our vicar at that time), an article on the Crusades and finally a second short sermon by Edward Harold, Lord Bishop of Ely. One thing that I found strange in these old magazines was that the name of the then vicar was never mentioned – I suppose the editors thought that their parishioners didn't need this information! There was no letter from the vicar or other member of the clergy as there is today.

It was not until January 1897 that Godmanchester began to have a magazine of its own, but in fact you could hardly call it a magazine, since it comprised one page of what (in those days) was called 'quarto', somewhat wider and shorter than our now familiar A4. Again it contained a note from

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the Bishop of Ely saying: 'I cannot let this your magazine begin its second year without a word of greeting from your pastor, to wish you a happy New Year and God's blessing on all you do in it'. This would intimate that we had a magazine in the previous year, although I couldn't find this in the Archives.

Once we had our own Parish News in January 1897 things obviously became more relevant to St Mary's alone. In March there had been a supper and entertainment provided for the choir by Mr P. E. Tillard in the Constitutional Hall. The final sentence of this report may interest our readers: 'An abundance of games had been provided after supper for the juniors, whilst the seniors beguiled the evening with conversation, song and the fragrance of smoke'. I wonder where the Constitutional Hall stood in Godmanchester?

In March 1897 the marriage was recorded on April 19 of Arthur Arnold to Charlotte Agnes Gadsby. Were these the parents of Vera I wonder? – I'm sure she will be able to tell me. In July there had been national rejoicings to celebrate the 60th year of Queen Victoria's reign. In Godmanchester tea had been organised for between 1500 and 1600 people, and, through public subscription, a costly and elegant chain of office had been provided for the then Mayor Mr P E Tillard, which was presented by Mr G. Hunnybun on behalf of the subscribers.

In November much of the magazine was devoted to the possibility of forming a branch of the MU in Godmanchester, so it seems our branch reached its centenary some time ago, having been in existence for around one hundred and twelve years.

In July 1898 mention was made of the first meeting of the Council of Church Workers at

the vicarage (is this the forerunner of our present PCC I wonder?). At the same time it was recorded that Mr Edgar Thackray (John's grandfather?) was elected to be on the council of the boys' Sunday School, and Miss G. Baumgartner to be District Visitor.

In August 1901 the event of the month had been the completion of the 'Bevan memorial' in the parish church, as well as the reredos and the screen in carved oak, which were blessed by the Bishop. The Archdeacon of the time remarked that the screen was a partial restoration of the older and larger 'Rood loft', which had formerly stood in the same place. He went on to say that everyone would be reminded of what we all owed to the Cross of Christ.

In November 1901 it was noted that the parish blankets would be issued between 12 and 1 in the Parish Room; in fact this annual distribution continued right up to 1910 and perhaps beyond, but this is as far as I had time to research. I wouldn't like to swop my duvet, although I believe the blankets were washed each spring when they were returned to the church!

Unfortunately, although I had spent the whole morning in the Archives section of our magnificent new library, I only managed to see the magazines up to 1910, and I have just picked out one or two items which I thought might be of interest to our readers. I might go in again at a later date – it would be very interesting I think to read our magazine (be it only one page) for the years of the 1st World War when many young men from both Huntingdon and Godmanchester joined the Huntingdonshire Cyclists' Battalion. I will try to do this sometime and write another article. However, I hope that maybe this will have given you a taste of our magazine all those years ago, and I would recommend you

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to visit the Archives section if you have time to spare. My visit concluded with a delicious lunch in the most attractive Café where the food is sold at very reasonable prices.

On reading this through I see that I have left a number of loose ends, questions to which I have no answers. I hope all the Gumcestrians who read this will be able to enlighten me, and other readers. I am sure the Editorial Committee will be pleased to publish any further information you can provide for us.

Please complete the enclosed flyer and leave it in the box on the table at the back of the church. We look forward to a wonderful weekend of celebrations.

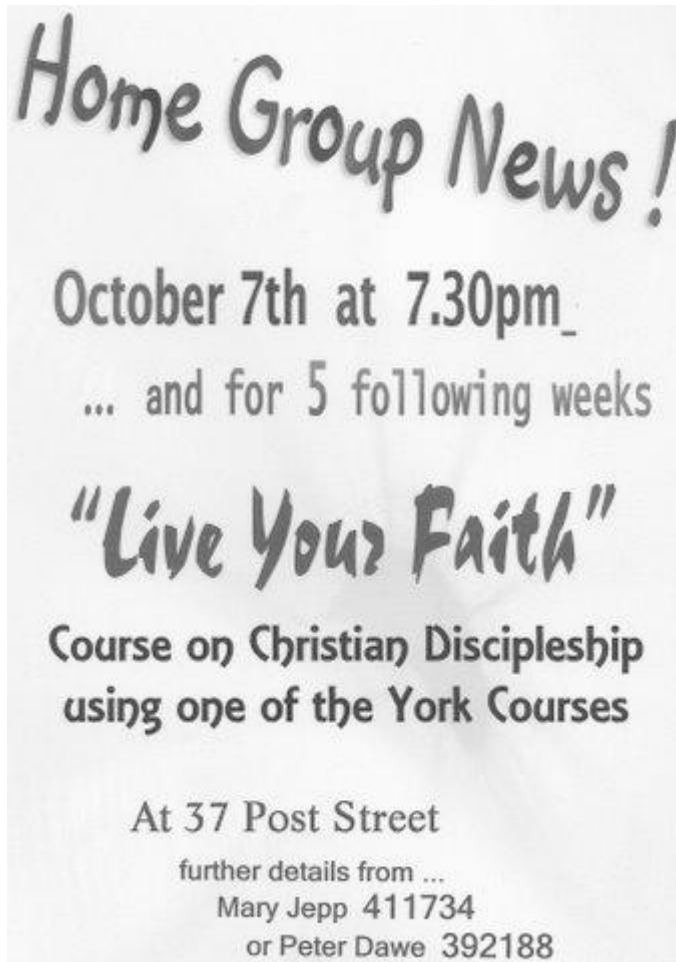
